



100th Anniversary of Dos Palos Portuguese D.E.S. Association

For 700 years, people of Portuguese descent around the world have carried on the tradition established by Queen Saint Isabel of Portugal in 1323, of holding an annual Festival of the Divine Holy Spirit, known in the Portuguese language as a "Festa do Divino Espirito Santo" a lively gathering open to all, promoting family reconciliation and peace, through prayer and charity.

Locally, this celebration began with the area's first Azorean immigrants and the 1923 incorporation of the Dos Palos Portuguese D.E.S. Association, making it one of our city's oldest organizations. Today these traditions are carried on by the descendants of those first immigrants and more recent arrivals from the Azores, Brasil, Canada, Angola, and Portugal.

Dos Palos Azorean descendants include Bishop Myron Cotta of Stockton, former Merced County Supervisor and current Monsignor Harvey Fonseca, pastor of the Shrine of St. Jude Thaddeus in Livingston, and current Merced County Supervisor Scott Silveira. Those who have served the City of Dos Palos include former Mayors Vito Bianculli, James Foster, and Michael Burns, former City Councilmembers Joseph Maiorino and Jim Kelley, former City Managers Tony Dias and Darrell Fonseca, former Chief of Police Tony Tacheira, Finance & Personnel Director Manuela Sousa, Public Works Director Gordon Bonds. City Treasurer Lori Lima, former City Attorneys Scott Jordan and Edward Amaral, and former Poundmaster Mike Areias.

The non-profit Dos Palos D.E.S. is funded by donations collected from many businesses, dairies, farms, ranches, and residents of various backgrounds and faiths. This enables the D.E.S. to conduct its annual celebrations, award scholarships, maintain a community

hall, park, and playground, and provide special one-time assistance to those in need.

Following weeks of prayer, the D.E.S. has on Saturday, a "Bode de Leite" literally "a gathering of milk" which includes an ox-cart parade, distribution of sweetbread, cheese, milk, blessing of animals, a free barbecued rib and tri-tip lunch, and an auction of animals and goods. Its Festa is held on Sunday, with processions attracting over 1,000 participants from Dos Palos and many neighboring communities, led by the American Legion color guard, with many children, and several marching bands. During the

celebration, the D.E.S. serves "sopas" a traditional meal of beef stew, cabbage, and spices, over mint and bread, to more than 2,000 people. The D.E.S. delivers hundreds of meals to local families who have experienced recent death, injury, or major illness.

All citizens, residents, and visitors, of all ages, and of all faiths, are encouraged and invited to participate in the 100th Anniversary Dos Palos D.E.S. Festa, its parades, processions, auctions, prayers, music, dances, and celebration on May 13 and 14, 2023. ◆





Queen Isabel & the festa tradition

Festas are held on weekends from April until August in areas settled by early immigrants from Portugal and the Azores islands. The festas stretch from the North Coast, down the San Joaquin Valley, and to San Diego.

There is a traditional depiction that shows Queen Isabel in 1296 that always

shows her with red roses in one hand and a small loaf of bread in the other.

The tradition stems from her habit of taking bread from the palace and secretly passing it to the poor and hungry.

One day according to legend, the king found out about it and confronted her and was asked to open her apron. When she opened her apron to reveal the stolen bread a miracle had occurred. Instead of bread, a bunch of red roses fell to the floor. Her generosity and love for her people had been honored by God.

Masses were said continuously during a nine day novena until the day of Pentecost when the people witnessed three ships sail up the harbor and dock in Lisbon. The three ships were filled with grain that helped bring their hunger to an end. It also began to rain after several years of drought. This was considered to b e a major miracle.

In thanksgiving to the Holy Spirit for this miraculous deliverance, the day of the Pentecost was declared a national holiday. The festive day was held in Portugal for centuries before being exported to the Azores islands and then to communities in California including Dos Palos with the immigration of Portuguese settlers.

Queen Isabel was canonized by Pope Urban the Eight in 1625. Her devotion to her people was symbolized by the promise she made to the Holy Spirit that if her people were delivered from famine and drought, she would lay her jeweled crown on the altar as a gift to the Church.

Replicas of her crown adorned with the dove, the Holy Spirit's symbol, were made. Queen Isabel began a custom of crowning and placing her cape on the poorest girl in the kingdom and the poorest male beggar. The custom of crowning and feeding the people of the community takes place still today through the annual festa — a tradition that gas survived for 700 years. •
